Discussion of the Stakeholder Report, showing 743 veterans receiving "Live Compensation" with an average of \$1905/month. Total monthly Federal VA Compensation to veterans in Marshall County is \$1,728,780 for the month of April 2026.

Iowa Department of Veterans Affairs County Veteran Service Officer Education and Accreditation Policy

References: 38 CFR 14.629; Iowa Code §35B.6; Iowa Administrative Code 801.7(2)

1. Purpose The purpose of this policy is to ensure that effective training is provided to County Veterans Service Officers (CVSO), County Veterans Service Officers in Training (CVSO-iT), and office staff members.

2. Accreditation

a. Primary Accreditation CVSOs will maintain primary accreditation with a national service organization. CVSOs will submit a VA form 21 to the department for additional primary accreditation with the Iowa Department of Veterans Affairs. IDVA will review and submit all VA form 21s to the VA Office of General Counsel for approval/disapproval.

b. Cross Accreditation CVSOs are required to apply for cross accreditation with veterans' organizations representing Iowa veterans at the Des Moines Veterans Affairs Regional Office and provide the department with a copy of the application.

c. System Access Per Iowa Code, Executive Directors and Administrators are required to obtain and maintain a PIV Card for access to VA computer programs (e.g., Outlook, SHARE, VBMS, Teams, etc.). It is highly encouraged that all CVSOs obtain and maintain a PIV Card.

3. Accreditation Recertification CVSOs are required to complete IDVA accreditation recertification annually. Recertification testing is conducted at the IDVA annual CVSO school and on the last day of the new service officer school.

a. Examination Requirements:

- (1) The exam is open book and consists of 50 questions.
- (2) The exam period is two hours.
- (3) The purpose of the exam is a check on learning.

b. National Service Organization Annual Training Certificates of Annual Training from a National Service Organization will be accepted in lieu of recertification testing.

4. County Veterans Service Officers-in-Training (CVSO-iT) County Commissions of Veterans Affairs must notify IDVA in writing within **one week of hire** that an employee has been hired or promoted to CVSO-iT and provide the employee's contact information. All CVSO-iT are required to complete VA TRiPs training, complete new CVSO school and comply with the requirements in paragraph 2 and 3 above within one year of hire. It is recommended that all CVSO-iT complete TRiPs training and apply for VA PIV card within one month of hire.

5. Education and training requirements CVSOs and CVSO-iTs must annually complete 20 Continuing Education Units (CEUs) from the attached course listing provided by the Iowa Department of Veterans Affairs and/or sponsored by a National Service Organization.

6. Training Waivers Education waivers are the exception and can only be approved by the IDVA Commandant. Waiver requests must be on letterhead and signed by the chair of the county commission of veterans' affairs.

5/5/26

Signed into law

HF 2491:

Requires Regent institutions to waive all tuition and mandatory fees for veterans with a permanent service-connected disability rating of 100% and who applies and is admitted to the institution. All other federal and state sources of assistance must first be exhausted.

Eligible for Governor's Signature

SF 93:

Allows members of the National Guard or reserve component that do not meet the definition of veteran per Iowa Code 35.1 to serve on county commissions of veterans affairs.

SF 2471:

Sets the fee for a lifetime fur harvester license at \$5 for Iowa residents who served on federal active duty and were disabled during military service.

IDVA Department Bills

SF 2466 (Governor's Bill): Passed Senate (with amendment that increases Iowa Veterans Trust Fund balance from \$50 to \$75 million); **Passed House Appropriations Committee** (with Governor's amendment that maintains \$10K county funding and funds incentive pool with \$250K from Iowa Lottery transfer to Veterans Trust Fund.

Creates a County Veteran Services Excellence Fund and Training Program and Administration Account to positively impact Iowa's 44th national ranking in receipt of annual per capita federal VA veterans compensation by incentivizing counties based on performance. Would also increase IDVA training support to county VSOs, procure a common claims software, and bring greater consistency and transparency in the delivery of these benefits. Reallocates existing \$300,000 appropriation currently distributed to counties by IDVA to achieve these objectives.

Other Bills

House:

HR 101: Adopted by House

A resolution honoring Staff Sergeant William Nathaniel Howard, Staff Sergeant Edgar Brian Torres-Tovar, and their families.

HR 103: Adopted by House

A resolution calling on Congress to support efforts to issue an Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, or similar recognition of having served in an area of hostility, to all United States troops who served in Honduras from 1981 to 1992.

HR 106: Adopted by House

A resolution calling on Congress to pass the Major Richard Starr Act

HR 114: Adopted by House

A resolution honoring the Iowans who were killed in or survived the attack on the USS Indianapolis on July 30, 1945.

HF 175: Passed House, passed Senate Veterans Committee

Expands existing definition of 'qualified military veteran' for undergraduate in-state tuition and fees at Regent institutions and community colleges by referencing the Iowa Code 35.1 definition and also including surviving spouses and children.

HF 779: Passed House, passed Senate Veterans Committee

Expands eligibility for 'National Guard' plates to Iowa National Guard members that have been honorably discharged, regardless of the number of years of service. Fees for the plates would be deposited into the Veterans License Fee Fund and be available for distribution by the Iowa Commission of Veterans Affairs.

HF 2761: Passed House

Authorizes a Gold Star spouse, child, parent, or sibling to have the designation "Gold Star Family" on their driver's license or ID card.

HF 1000: Passed House

Establishes a veteran service organization grant program administered by the Iowa Department of Veterans Affairs with an initial appropriation of \$250,000.

Senate:

SR 101: Adopted by Senate

A resolution honoring Staff Sergeant William Nathaniel Howard, Staff Sergeant Edgar Brian Torres-Tovar, and their families.

SF 2186: Passed Senate, Passed House Veterans Affairs Committee

This bill allows for a servicemember parent who is unable to exercise court-ordered physical care or visitation due to a deployment of 30 days or less to make up that time 30 days immediately prior to or after the deployment.

SF 2472: Passed Senate

Changes the military property tax exemption for assessment years beginning on or after January 1, 2026 to not exceed the lesser of two percent of the taxable value of the property or \$14,000, but not less than \$5,000.

SF 2466 County Veterans Services Excellence Program Legislation

The Iowa Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA) believes that county veteran service officers (CVSO) provide a vital and much needed service and Iowa veterans will benefit greatly with passage of this legislation. The proposed County Veterans Services Excellence Program is **state budget neutral**.

As of federal FY24, the most current Veterans Administration data available*, **Iowa ranks 44 of 53 states and territories** in per capita annual veteran compensation at \$6,205. Additionally, in terms of per capita compensation only six Iowa counties are above the national average and seven are above the national median.

The **Iowa Commission of Veterans Affairs** lists encouraging efficiencies, innovation, and incentivizing high performance of CVSOs as a **top five 2026 legislative priority**. **As amended by the Senate**, SF 2466 also adjusts the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund for inflation by increasing the balance from \$50 to \$75 million through continued annual transfers from the Iowa Lottery. This is also a **top five 2026 legislative priority** of the **Iowa Commission of Veterans Affairs**.

The **Iowa National Guard**, **Veterans of Foreign Wars**, and **Disabled American Veterans-Iowa** have all filed in favor of this bill.

Payments to Iowa veterans total \$1.104 billion annually and represent a significant economic impact to the state. However, only 52,000 Iowa veterans currently receive benefits (29%). A comparison with peer states shows there is an urgent need to act:

An increase of just 10% of current compensation levels is a \$110 million annual boost of federal dollars into the state, resulting in a per capita of \$6,825 with Iowa ranking 37th nationally, just ahead of Minnesota but still well behind several other peers. This is a very achievable goal and should be aggressively pursued.

As amended by the House, counties would retain the current annual \$990K County Commission of Veterans Affairs Fund standing appropriation. Additionally, \$250K from the annual Iowa Lottery transfer to the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund would be used to incentivize counties to effectively increase veteran outreach and efficiency in the application for individual federal veteran compensation.

- Beginning in FY28, directs IDVA to incent counties based on performance criteria determined by the department. Counties must increase the annual amount of benefits distributed by 5% to qualify.
- IDVA would write rules to comply with the legislation.
- **Population neutral:** Based on per-capita receipt of compensation and fair to counties of all sizes.

Reallocates existing \$300K County Commission of Veterans Affairs Training Program transfer from the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund to the IDVA Training Fund.

- IDVA will purchase VA claims submission software and provide it to counties at no cost.
- All counties would be trained in and required to use this software, which many already use.
- IDVA would have statewide claim visibility and performance metrics, which it would share with county commissions and boards of supervisors.
- Seamless transfer of claims between CVSOs and elimination of paper claims.
- IDVA would add an education coordinator to expand upon the training that IDVA already provides on a year-round basis and allow for more one-on-one training, particularly with newly-hired CVSOs.
